

Splendid, ever-changing hues from a dramatic mountain backdrop, inspired two design auteurs to infuse and furnish their Palm Springs home with color

hen Classic Chic CEO Patrick Mundt and his partner, Rich Young, purchased their new home in the Los Compadres neighborhood of Palm Springs, it was, in Patrick's words "basically a shell no color, just gray walls and cement floors." As they "strategized" for the initial design phase, they became increasingly mesmerized by the mercurial hues of the dramatic mountain and golf course vistas flanking their new 3,800-square-foot residence.

"We were here at all hours of the day," Mundt recalls. "In the mornings, the golf course is just golden with the sunrise; the ponds and grass are gorgeous. As the sun rises more, the front mountains turn into beautiful oranges, purples, magentas, and fiery reds — the surroundings are always changing all day long."

"I think living in Palm Springs is all about the beautiful mornings and glorious sunsets that we have here on the mountains," says Young, who owns a small publishing company, but shifted into an alternate creative mode to choose and oversee execution of much of the home's interior design elements. "The color palette of oranges, reds, desert tans, and sky blue really sums up Palm Springs."

o realize their vivid interpretation of the desert landscape in a home they aptly define as "California" contemporary classic," the intrepid design duo drew primarily from the resources of Classic Chic, an elegant design emporium which Mundt brought to the desert six years ago from Laguna Beach. Today, Classic Chic — located in the Atrium Design Center of Rancho Mirage — encompasses a 12,000-square-foot showroom featuring custom and top-name furniture and home accessories, as well as a knowledgeable staff of innovative interior design consultants. The Classic Chic experience extends to

Mundt and Young's Palm Springs residence where they occasionally host open houses for customers. A growing collection of contemporary art adorns several interior (and patio) walls, including an elegant Erté; a modern masterpiece titled Monarchs by Hunt Slonem; two striking oils by local artist Peter Carter — Reeds and Fire and Water — and

a whimsical, tri-color, welded-steel triptych by San Francisco-based sculptor Dan Das Mann.

he personalized color scheme of vibrant jewel tones and desert tans proliferate throughout the house, which also features a casual den, three guest rooms, a master bedroom overlooking the pool, five bathrooms, and an office adjacent to the scenic eighth hole of a public golf course.

Their expansive modern kitchen — perfect for entertaining ("anything over 20, it's 1-800-catering," quips Young) — includes Russian Volga blue granite counters, an abundance of orange-hued maple cabinetry, a sunny breakfast nook, and an indoor/outdoor Thermador grill overlooking the pool and elevated Jacuzzi. "With our bifold doors that pocket out to the bar area, this is great for hors d'oeuvres and grilled vegetables," Young says. "It's very workable and truly a gourmet kitchen — perfect for inviting a visiting chef in for a fun 'cooking class' party for friends."

Adjacent to the kitchen, the spacious great room — a showroom in itself with 16-foot ceilings — proffers both casual comfort and fine dining with a fiery red silk, overstuffed sofa, and a circular glass dining set. Illuminated at night by a spherical chandelier and a backlit onyxcrowned buffet, the setting provides the perfect vantage point to view several elegant furnishings from Classic Chic, as well as highlighted pieces imbued with sentimental value.

Glass and light are ubiquitous, inviting nearly invisible thresholds to indoor and outdoor living. Exterior walls painted in shades of terra cotta, watermelon and desert sand, as well as a spectacular view of Mt. San Jacinto, playfully highlight the cerulean reflections of the pool and elevated Jacuzzi. In the poolside powder room, blue tones proliferate in the smoked glass vanity and mosaicstyle tiled shower.

An in-ground fire pit and graceful edging of Carolina cherry trees complement the tranquil outdoor milieu.

Though their design styles differ — "Rich prefers Tuscan, I enjoy cleaner lines," says Young, "so this house was a nice balance"— their Palm Springs haven is a uniquely personal and harmonious tribute to the vibrant colors in nature.

Entertaining options are endless via the Thermador indoor/outdoor grill that overlooks the wet bar and front loggia. Local artist Peter Carter provides a vivid rendition of nature's capricious colors in Fire and Water, an oil on canvas gracing the outdoor fireplace.
